## Claiming rule change to take effect May 17

A rule change aimed at preserving Maryland's horse population took effect on May 17.

Under the new rule, only trainers assigned stalls at Pimlico, Laurel and Bowie are eligible to enter a claim. An owner who does not employ the services of a trainer with stalls at a Maryland track is allowed to claim only to replace a horse lost to a claim in Maryland (lose one/claim one).

The new rule is similar to those in Delaware and New York.

The MTHA board supported the change by unanimous vote at its April 11 meeting.

The Maryland Racing Commission agreed, by unanimous vote at its April 17 meeting, to propose the rule change on an emergency basis. It then proceeded

## Bowie Training Center faces no immediate threat

### *Sale would require change in law*

Horsemen should not be alarmed about recent news reports indicating that Bowie Training Center is up for sale, said MTHA President Richard Hoffberger.

"Selling Bowie would require a change in state law," Mr. Hoffberger explained. "If it does happen, it will be a long process. Accommodations for Bowie horsemen almost certainly will be at the top of the list of priorities for the state legislature. And the MTHA, as always, stands well-prepared to represent horsemen's interests."

Racing at Bowie was brought to an end under a track consolidation plan successfully negotiated by the groups that owned Pimlico and Laurel at that time.

The state agreed to give Laurel and Pimlico exclusive rights to mile-track racing, but required that the tracks maintain Bowie as a training center.

At the same time, Laurel and Pimlico received substantial financial compensation in the form of a reduction in the state's share of the takeout.

Under the terms of the agreement, a portion of the tracks' newfound revenue was to go toward the maintenance of the facilities at Bowie.

through the rules changing process.

"This change will eliminate the practice of out-of-state stables 'raiding' our horse population at the end of a meet," explained MTHA President Richard Hoffberger. "Last spring, when Pimlico ended and our summer live racing hiatus began, there were a number of claims by out-of-state horsemen. And it was difficult, if not impossible, to replace those horses from out-of-state locations."

Maryland Jockey Club president Lou Raffetto has promised to provide stall assignments for trainers who are based at Maryland farms and training centers, allowing them to remain eligible to enter claims.



mitted for three years.

The H-2C visa would be valid for three years and renewable for another three.

H-2C workers would have an opportunity to apply for permanent resident status (Green Card), either through an employer or by self-petitioning, after five years of employment.



Broad reform legislation similar to the STRIVE Act has not yet been introduced in the Senate. But the White House and various Senators are attempting to craft such legislation.

## IN MEMORIAM

**Frank Shenski**, one of Maryland's longest-active owner/trainers and a fixture at Bowie since the early 1950s, died April 28. He was 93. Mr. Shenski, who made his home on Race Track Road near the entrance to Bowie, was a leading trainer in this state early in his career. He retired in 2001, but continued to attend the races until recently. Mr. Shenski was a combat veteran of World War II.

**George Clarke**, 72, a former owner/trainer who served as the stall superintendent at Pimlico before retiring about six years ago, died April 29. Mr. Clarke had also operated a vanning business for many years.

## Health Fair schedule

**H**Health Fairs, co-sponsored by the MTHA and Maryland Horsemen's Assistance Fund, will be conducted free of charge for backstretch workers at Bowie, Laurel and Pimlico. *See schedule at right.*

Services, provided by Adventist Health Care, will include lipid profiling, HIV and hepatitis C (HCV) testing, screenings for blood pressure, body fat composition, carbon monoxide and skin cancer, PSA testing, colo-rectal counseling, plus seated massage therapy and more.

Health promoters will be on hand to answer questions.

Important note: Cholesterol tests require a 12-hour fast (no food or drink in the 12 hours before the test). HIV and HCV tests require pre-approval by a physician. Individuals seeking HIV and/or HCV testing should visit Dr. Harry M. Harris in the Backstretch Health Center prior to the Health Fair.

The Health Center is open Fridays and Saturdays in the track kitchen building at Laurel, and Tuesdays in the First Aid Room at Pimlico. Hours are 9 a.m. to noon at both locations.

They established a new organization known as the Maryland Thoroughbred Horsemen's Association (MTHA), and petitioned the Racing Commission to become the official representative for owners and trainers in this state.

Until that time, for many years, Maryland horsemen had been affiliates of a national organization that assessed heavy financial dues while falling far short in its commitment to the needs of local horsemen.

This year the MTHA reaches an im-

portant milestone. It has stood the test of time for 20 years.

∞ Board meetings open to all members.

∞ A board of directors increased in size to 15 (composed of seven owners, seven trainers and one from either category).
